- Since 2007, KWDI has been carrying out "Longitudinal Survey of Women and Family" and "Korean Women Manager Panel", which are longitudinal section data on women's work and life.
- This symposium aims at sharing researching findings on various issues related to women and family in Korean society by using KWDI's panel survey data and seeking policy challenges by participating researchers and panel data experts in women's labor and family field.
 - This symposium is sponsored by Korean Family Studies Association, Korean Sociological Association, Korean Association of Women's Studies, The population Association of Korea, the Korean Association for Survey Research, Korea Labor and Employment Relations Association, the Korean Labor Economic Association, Korean Academy of Organization and Management, and the Korean Women Economists Association.

<Introduction to KWDI's Panel Survey>

- Since 2007, KWDI has begun researching on the "Longitudinal Survey of Women and Family" and the "Korean Women's Manager Panel" in order to broaden the base of research on women's policies and to build longitudinal data. As of 2018, the 7th wave survey is in progress
 - [Longitudinal Survey of Women and Family] It is conducted for women aged 19 to 64 years old living in the Republic of Korea. It has contributed to the production of basic statistics such as low fertility, aging, child care, life cycle economic activities, family relations and structure, work and family compatibility, women's health and family policy establishment.
 - [Korean Women Manager Panel] It is conducted for women assistant manager working in companies with more than 100 employees. It is used as a basic data to determine the main policy making and performance of the women manager in Korea by understanding their work status, career development, work conditions, managerial path and work-family balance.
